


PATIENT GROWTH

Current: 40,035




PHYSICIAN GROWTH

PROGRAM TIMELINE





PUBLIC ACT 12-55

Designed to enable the palliative use of marijuana by seriously ill patients while preventing misuse or diversion Gave immunity from state criminal and civil penalties to patients, caregivers, physicians and market participants Created a framework for medically focused program



REGULATIONS

Reinforce the medical model of industry oversight

Establish robust licensing and operational requirements for producers, dispensary facilities and their employees

Place restrictions on advertising and external displays to prevent improper steering of patients and negative impacts on local communities



PUBLIC ACT 16-23

Effective as of October 1, 2016:

- Allowed minors to register as patients under limited circumstances
- Permitted delivery to inpatient care facilities such as hospice
- Extended legal protections to nurses
- Established framework for Connecticutbased research



MEDICAL MODEL

 Physicians serve as gatekeepers in the program and in advisory role for the Department



- Producers are regulated like pharmaceutical manufacturers
- Dispensary Facilities regulated like pharmacies
- Medications treated like other controlled substances
- Research Programs must be thoughtfully designed and administered



WHO CAN REGISTER

> Physician must certify that patients:

- Have an approved debilitating medical condition
- That medical marijuana would do more good than harm for a patient's health
- If there is a need for a caregiver

Solution Caregiver requirements:

- 18 years of age or older
- No violation of certain controlled substance laws
- Responsible for one patient (with limited exceptions)



PATIENTS UNDER 18

- Patients under 18 may register under certain conditions:
 - Support by two physicians
 - Parent or legal guardian will serve as caregiver
 - Have one of a limited group of debilitating conditions
 - May not purchase smoke-able, inhalable or vaporizable products





PATIENT REQUIREMENTS

- Possess no more than a one-month supply (2.5 ounces)
- Not use medical marijuana in a way that endangers others
- Store marijuana in a secure location
- Not use marijuana in a prohibited place



QUALITY MEDICATION

- Pharmaceutical Grade
- Laboratory tested
- Labeled with active ingredients
- Unadulterated
- Variety of dosage forms
- Tamper resistant packaging
- Non-recreational naming protocol




MARKETING RESTRICTIONS

- Modeled after federal rules for advertising of controlled substances
- Covers materials intended, or likely, to induce purchase of marijuana
- Advertisements must be submitted to DCP
- Prohibitions:
 - Free samples
 - False or misleading
 - Unsupported health claims
 - Inducements that steer patients to specific products
 - Obscene or encourage underage or recreational use




